ARTISTS PLAYGROUND BY PULLMAN

Pullman hotels are committed to design, art and photography and while I was there they launched Artist Playground. They collaborate with artists and designers to create a part gallery, part studio to inspire guests. Diversity - HeForShe by Rittipong Nupon, a talented Phuket artist, was created to support efforts by male artists against inequalities faced by today's women.

The human body and complicated postures using splatter painting techniques define Rittpong's work. He gets his inspiration from photographs rather than using live models.

FROM PULLMAN TO PATONG

Day two was totally chilling!! I started off with the buffet breakfast · it was one of the best I've ever had. Bloody Mary for starters followed by every imaginable hot and cold breakfast item from sushi to baked ham to Thai delights. Patong is all about nightlife and water sports, be it yachting, jet ski, paddle board or para sailing. It's brash, in your face and fun. Yes, there are touts and hawkers and you have to rent a chair and umbrella on the beach, but that's ok. The





sunsets are sensational. I thoroughly enjoyed my couple of days there.

THE FACE OF THE OLD TOWN

Phuket Old Town on the other hand is rather sophisticated and perfect for a day trip. My focus was on the street art. It is best explored on foot starting at the fountain circle at the top of Yaowarat Road. I grabbed a coffee and snack at the excellent Gallery Cafe and continued to Krabi Road where there are many stunning shophouses, the superb Thai Hua Museum and the former Governor's Mansion now the Blue Elephant Restaurant.

A narrow alleyway on the left leads to the Downtown Market where you can see a few examples of street art including a large image of Mardi, the three eyed baby, by one of Thailand's most instantly recognisable artists, Alex Face. It brightens up a rather grubby wall. This, and many other murals, were drawn as part of the Food Art Town Phuket (FAT Phuket) celebrating Phuket becoming a UNESCO Creative City of Gastronomy in 2015 and represents breakfast at the market.

MANY MORE MURALS

Phang Nga Road has dozens of murals. Two are by Phichit Paidaeng and located near to Yaowarat Road. The first shows an auntie in her home kitchen with two family members with her, the second depicts a hawker frying oyster omelette. By the On On Hotel, famous for being in "The Beach" movie starring Leonardo DiCaprio, Liudmila Letnikova & Lolay painted the Chinese New Year celebrations.

Opposite is a huge mural by Mue Bon which features a turtle pulling Bon's trademark 'Pukrok' bird holding a spray can. In an alley leading to a car park by the Sinthavee Hotel is an excellent selection of art including a fantastic hornbill by Charcoal. Next to it P7's tiger represents Phuket's kopi culture of drinking coffee with snacks, many of which are hidden in the image.

BABA LADY


